Seeley's Bay Tourism History (by Dan Roantree)

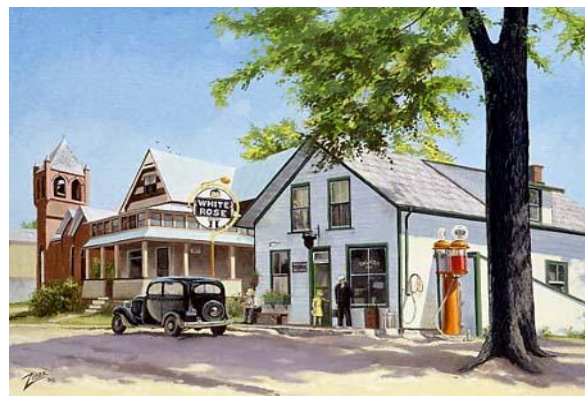
When Seeley's Bay emerged as a village in the 1860's and 1870's, it developed into a service centre for local farmers. In less than a century tourism rose from being an unknown concept in the Seeley's Bay community to an employer second only to agriculture. Just how important tourism and recreation was to the local economy was evident in the number of resorts clustered in and around the village by the mid-nineteen hundreds. When the automobile became a popular and reliable form of transportation, people from the

larger cities and especially Americans were drawn to Seeley's Bay because of its access and proximity to lakes such as Cranberry, Whitefish, Dog, South and Grippen to name a few.

Around 1930 one of the first hotels to cater to fishermen was Bob Coleman's Hotel located at 152 Main Street. In those days the clientele were fishing parties, mostly men, who ate in the dining room and took shore lunches with them on their fishing trips. They usually hired a guide who provided the boat and manned the oars. It was later called the Rideau Lake Inn operated by Gerry C. Downs and boasted modern rooms, cabins, reasonable rates, *a la carte* restaurant, home cooking, good fishing, boats, motors and guides as its attractions. The Metcalf Hotel located at 138 Main St. also catered to fishing parties and had a dining room open to the public as well as its guests. Some of the local fishing guides at this time were Manford Ralph, Maurice Murphy, Herb Mallen and Earl, Jim and Ed Free.

Other resorts that served meals to its guests were: The Maples at 109 Adelaide St. established by Herb Mallen and owned later by Jack and Juanita Abrams, and Pleasant View Resort built and run by Horace and Alice Wilkinson at 137 Haskins Point Road.

By the 1940's tourist resorts were being built that were mainly house-keeping cottages making it possible for families to enjoy local fishing, canoeing, boating and the privacy of their own shelter. Moreover, the separate cottages and cabins made it possible for each family to keep tabs on its own children and to prepare its own food to keep costs down. Rideau View is one such Resort that was established by Borden Dean who had several housekeeping cottages at the end of Dean's Road. Horace Wilkinson, at 119 Haskins Point Road, built Sunny Acres Resort. He also had only housekeeping cottages. Sunny Acres is owned and operated by Walter and Rita Stoller today with full marina services. Rideau Breeze Resort and Marina was built by Harold and Irene Wheeler at 143 Haskins Point Road having housekeeping cottages as well as gas, oil and fishing supplies for sale. Today it is owned and operated by Roger White, and it is *the* spot to buy fishing licenses.

Since most of the early cottages did not have electricity, almost all cottage resorts had an icehouse on site to supply their cottagers with a block of ice for the cottage icebox every two or three days. Bill Moroughan, who lived on Adelaide Street, owned an ice-cutting machine that many people used or rented to cut ice blocks from the bay for their cottages, homes and/or business.

Other resorts established in the area by mid-century were: Melody Lodge, Burnt Hills Lodge and Elm Lodge on Carrying Place Road, and Terry's Terrace on Burnt Hills Road. Dr. Hewitt from Chicago built one of the earliest cottages in the area on Hewitt's Island. His family later owned and operated the Metcalf Hotel. The cottage is still in the Hewitt family.



Sometimes we who were born and raised in this area wonder what there is worth seeing near at hand, and it's only after we have left and returned that we come to appreciate how few places in Ontario are so favoured and how romantically beautiful these lands and waters really are.

Ratepayers' Association studies *First Impressions*

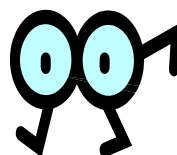
Seeley's Bay is partnering with Otonabee-South Monaghan (near Peterborough) to learn more about the first impressions our communities make on visitors as well as prospective residents and businesses. A team from Otonabee-South Monaghan will make a surprise *incognito* visit to Seeley's Bay sometime this summer and then return to present a report to all of us at a public meeting here in the early fall. A team of volunteers from Seeley's Bay will do the same thing for the community of Otonabee-South Monaghan. Our two communities have been 'matched' under the **First Impressions** program by the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Rural Affairs because of the similarity of size and economic base of the two communities. Keene, at the centre of Otonabee-South Monaghan, is close to Rice Lake and is also a fishing mecca. **Please plan to attend the meeting** – watch for details on public notice boards in the village.

Message from local Township Councillor

We all know that we have a great volunteer fire department. They are well trained and have the proper tools to do their job. They train every Monday night to ensure that they keep up to date on techniques and new equipment. We all have good fire insurance rates because our Fire department is known to be professional and able to do a good job. To enhance this capability the Township is building a Fire Training facility at the Township site outside Lyndhurst. It will provide rural fire fighters from Eastern Ontario with class room training as well as state of the art training equipment that will simulate real fires be they in a house or car. The facility will also be used to train fire fighters on driving on narrow country roads, the 401, intersection skills and water retrieval from a water source. Fire Chiefs from Eastern Ontario have signed on to use the facility which will be the only Fire training facility in Eastern Ontario and will be run at on a revenue neutral basis.

The start up in spring 2011 will see people attending the new facility from elsewhere, and enjoying the recreation, accommodation, food and shopping that our area has to offer.

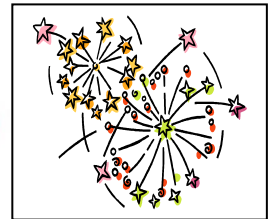
...And Stay for the Hospitality

Every year when these men visit Sunny Acres, they fish all day, and have fantastic feasts and tell tall fish tales in the evening. Bob Bolger oversees the daily fish counts and then announces the winners at the final ceremony where the much-coveted plaques are awarded, for 'most fish', 'smallest pike', 'biggest sunfish', etc. All of the U.S. visitors interviewed for this story practice 'catch and release' and other good conservation techniques, in respect of our environment.
